In casino news this week, Win-River Resort and Casino has released a draft environmental impact statement on their plan to relocate Win-River to a new location along I-5.

Hard Rock is focusing on expanding the regional and West Coast presence of the brand with the new Hard Rock Hotel and Casino, with a partnership between the Enterprise Rancheria Tribe and the Seminole Tribe of Florida.

"We're opening the property in fall of 2019," Mark BIRTHA, president of Hard Rock's new property confirmed. This is a landmark property for the company as it will be the first Hard Rock Hotel & Casino that will be licensed and managed on the west coast after their recent acquisition of Hard Rock's brand rights west of the Mississippi about two and half years ago.

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Win-River Resort and Casino would like to move to a new location

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Win-River Resort and Casino would like to move next to the freeway. The draft environmental impact statement has been released on a plan to relocate Win-River to a new location along I-5. It is quite an ambitious project. There are several alternatives: the full build-out would be on 232 acres of Rancheria-owned land, called "Strawberry Fields," along I-5 and the south Bonnyview freeway interchange immediately south of Redding.
